Summary: Overall (i)



After falling by 22% in 2022 the Student Living Index has dropped again, this time by 30%. [1]

This may be due to a mix of a heavier reliance on term time incomes from student loans and a reduction in spending on typical activities and items since last year.

- Edinburgh, Glasgow, London and Coventry are the regions with the highest cost of living, with Edinburgh coming out on top for the second year in a row. [1]
- The lowest, or best, living index this year goes to **Bournemouth**, closely followed by **Cardiff**. [1]

The Student Living Index is worked out by average monthly living and accommodation costs ÷ average monthly income. The lower the number, the 'better' the score.

Where we refer to cities, please note this includes further education institutions in this location such as London, Leeds, Manchester, Liverpool etc.

Summary: Overall (ii)

- All cities have seen an improvement this year in comparison to 2022.
- Reliance on student loans has increased this year, with 54% of students using it as their primary source of income. [2]
- Despite the improvement in the Student Living Index, 46% of students say they find themselves running out of money before the end of the semester – up from 35% in 2022. [3]

- **Outside of rent**, supermarket spend continues to be the single biggest outgoing for students each month. [4]
- Bournemouth and Cardiff top the table for student income, with
 Edinburgh and Glasgow having the lowest term time incomes. [5]
- Average student monthly rents across the UK have increased by 30% since 2022, with London the most expensive place for students to rent, removing Manchester from the top spot last year. [6]
- Liverpool students continue to be the biggest spenders on alcohol, spending around £52.97 per month – 71% more than the UK average. [7]





Summary: Sources of income (i)





On average, student loans make up 54% of students' monthly income – up from 49% in 2022. [8]

- Less than one in five students use their own income to pay their rent. [9]
- Scottish students are less reliant on student loans, or they have smaller loans to finance their living – which could be linked to tuition fees being free for local students. [10]
- Students in **Bournemouth** are the most likely to rely on their loan as their primary source of income, with 73% using it. [10]

Summary: Sources of income (ii)



- Students in **Oxford and Coventry** are the most likely to rely on their parents /family for income. Oxford students are 49.8% above average and Coventry students are 39.6%. [11]
- Students in Cardiff have the highest term time income from part time work, with an average of £219.54 per month, despite spending less time in work than the top four universities.
 [12]
- Students in Oxford, Edinburgh and Newcastle are the most likely to use income from holiday work as part of their spending during term time when at university. The three universities have the highest contribution of holiday income. [13]
- Students in Oxford rely less on student loans than average. However, they are the most likely to depend on income from scholarships/bursaries compared to other universities. [10, 14]

Summary: Activities (i)





On average, **time spent on academic studies has increased since 2022**, while time spent socialising has decreased slightly. [15]

- Despite the economic challenges facing students, the average number of hours spent in part time work each month decreased from 43.16 to 18.3.
 [15]
- The number of hours spent studying increased from 84.42 to 119.35, with socialising and hobbies seemingly the areas where time was sacrificed. [15]
- Students are spending much more time using streaming services, averaging 35.86 hours compared to 16.5 hours in 2022. This means that streaming services have overtaken the time spent going out with friends (30.14 hours). [16]

Summary: Activities (ii)



- Money spent on socialising and hobbies has decreased dramatically since 2022. Students now spend £52.55 and £30.54 per month on these activities respectively. This is a significant cut from £70 and £92 per month in 2022. [17]
- Students in Bristol, Coventry and Portsmouth spend the most hours each month in part time work, with students at these universities averaging over 24 hours per month.
 [18]
- The percentage of students with part time jobs actually decreased from 46% to 42%. [19]
- Students in Oxford also spend the largest number of hours studying on campus each month, spending 126.91 hours per month on their academic studies on campus. [20]
- While their Oxford-based counterparts lead the way for oncampus studying, students in London, Glasgow and Cambridge top the table for time spent studying at home. [21]

Summary: Monthly expenditure






Supermarket spend remains the top monthly cost this year for UK students, having increased by 44% since last year. [22]

- Overall, average monthly expenditure has fallen by 9% since the previous year. [23]
- Going out spending continues to fall year-on-year, dropping by an average of £11 per month in 2023. [24]

- Student spend on alcohol at home and while out has dropped by 29%.
 This could be an indication that they are finding cheaper deals or cutting down on drinking entirely. [25]
- Liverpool students continue to be the biggest spenders on alcohol, spending around £52.97 per month – 71% more than the UK average. [26]
- London has taken the top place for monthly rent costs, seeing an average monthly increase of £335 since 2022. [27]

Summary: Money management





47% of UK students have found themselves running out of money by the end of the semester – this has increased from 35% last year, suggesting an impact from a higher cost of living. [28]

- Students in Cambridge are likely to save the most each month (+148% vs UK average) – five times as much as those in Nottingham. [29]
- Less than 1 in 4 UK students find managing their money stressful – especially in Bournemouth, Lincoln and Liverpool. [30]

- Stress of managing money has increased overall by 28% YoY. [30]
- Students who say they feel their university supports them with money management is just 5%, with
 Coventry sitting at just 2%. [31]

Summary: Motivations and expectations





The top reason to pick a university is still **subject choice**, with it increasing in importance this year. Whilst subject choice has increased, university reputation decreased to just 17%, from a high of 23% in 2021. [32]

• **Portsmouth** jumped to the top of the pile, alongside Lincoln, as the universities chosen because of subject choice. [33]

- **Oxford** is way out in front this year when it comes to reputation at 55%, with York (38%), Cambridge and Coventry (both 31%) following. [34]
- **Sheffield** is the top university chosen due to it being close to home, followed by Birmingham, Leeds and Lincoln. [35]

Summary: Wellbeing and sustainability





14% of students have used alcohol to help cope with stress and/or mental health issues caused by money concerns, up from 8% in 2022. [36]

Only 1 in 10 students use mental health services at their university, and the percentage of students who seek therapy has decreased. [36]

The percentage of students seeking additional support from family as a result of money worries has increased from 23% in 2022 to 36% in 2023. [36]

- Only 1 in 20 students feel that their university is doing enough to support them with managing their finances.
 [37]
- The percentage of students who feel stressed about their studies has increased slightly from 31% to 35%, with students in Oxford and Cambridge experiencing the most stress. [38]
- Despite this, the percentage of students enjoying their degree has also increased from 36% to 38%.
 Students in Bristol and Coventry enjoy their degrees the most, while those in Birmingham and Bournemouth enjoy them the least. [39]

Summary: Frauds and scams





The number of students being a victim of and being targeted by scams has decreased this year, continuing the downward trend from 2021 onwards.

- 33% of students said they'd encountered or been a victim of fraud or scam in the past year, down from 47% in 2022. [40]
- The most common scam was a delivery service scam, with 14% of those that had been targeted by this method. [41]

 Leeds, Liverpool, Bristol and Leicester students have seen the fewest scam attempts in 2023. Those in Edinburgh are the second most targeted, behind only Bournemouth students. [40]

Summary: Cost of living and the future (i)

40% of students feel their universities do nothing to help with the cost-of-living crisis. [42]

- Bournemouth had the highest number of students who felt they had no support from their university at 58% - over 45% up on the UK average. [42]
- Most universities have performed poorly when it comes to supporting students through the cost-of-living crisis.

- Reducing the number of items bought online is the most widely adopted change to live within budgets this year, with 62% of students saying they've taken that action. [43]
- Nights out have also taken a hit, with 51% of respondents saying they'd reduced the amount of nights out they'd gone on. 34% of students said they reduced the number of meals they'd eaten per day to live within their budget. [43]





Summary: Cost of living and the future (ii)

- 86% of students expect the cost of living to rise further in the next academic year. [44]
- 46% of students expect the cost of living to rise by up to 15% next year, while 33% expect it to rise at a higher rate between 16% and 30%.
 [44]
- When it comes to plans after university, the most popular options considered by students are renting their own living space or moving to a new location for work. [45]
- **York** students are most likely to plan to rent their own living space after university.
- **Bournemouth and Manchester** students are most likely to plan to take an extended holiday/break.

• Edinburgh and Glasgow students are the least likely to plan to move back in with their parents/guardians after university. Bristol students are most likely to move abroad to live and work after completing their degrees.





































Average costs on social activities have jumped across the board, with the expected spend on a coffee the only number to see a decrease compared to 2022, perhaps showing inflation starting to bite.








Attitude towards money management














What motivated you to choose to study at your university?



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


















